## OBSERVATIONS FROM THE RECTOR

I recently finished reading *An American Awakening* by Courtney Cowart, who was a church historian employed by Trinity Church, Wall Street, NYC, and involved in their various grants programs. She was on site when 9/11 occurred in 2001 and then continued on with heavy involvement with those who responded, firefighters, police, and food, medical and shelter providers. Courtney saw St. Paul's Chapel move from more typical church activities and protocols to first hand attention to basic human needs. This was not without various moments of tension, both because of the grave situation and also the better known ways of conducting church affairs.

Courtney was then recruited by the Episcopal Diocese to move to New Orleans after the Katrina disaster and assume some parallel roles in that city. Here an American awakening continued not only for Dr. Cowart, but also for Bishop Charles Jenkins of Louisiana, and countless others who witnessed the devastation and the unequal and uneven responses to various elements of the population. (The book may be borrowed from St. Martha's.)

I believe that we are experiencing a somewhat parallel situation in the midst of today's stumbling economic times. We will hopefully seek to maintain our basic typical church programs and needs without a diminished concern for those most hurting. We count on the continued pledge commitments as well as helpful plate and additional contributions as we see some curtailment of renters and other vacationers in our area. We feel committed to maintain our unique efforts to reach out to the

upcoming generation in this country and abroad, most particularly:

25 youngsters are being given scholarships to attend Camp Arrowhead for a week. Most names came through our contacts with local school counselors.

Picnics provided for over 50 international students, along with helpful gift packets and gently used bikes for many.

The start up of our August drive to provide back packs with all needed school supplies for 30 boys and girls living in the Hickory Tree low income housing development outside Selbyville.

Financial assistance to Our Little Roses, an orphanage and school for 85 abandoned girls in a Honduran slum, whose start-up was spearheaded by the wife of the Episcopal Bishop of Honduras.

Food For Thought, which provides additional meals for low income students at Frankford Elementary School.

In the midst of all that we are about be mindful of those who show up to worship with us. Welcome them in the midst of our church responsibilities. Help them find seats, worship folders and hymnals. Please hold our parish mission statement regularly before you. Continue to wonder how we may more fully respond to the needs and concerns of our congregation and those people who share this world with us.

I pray that we may be open to God's leading in all our decision making and interactions during this potentially fruitful year.

I welcome your suggestions as to opportunities for spiritual growth, caring for one another and needs we might reach out to in this part of

God's creation. I continue to be open to a healthy sharing of suggestions and views, and invite you to join me on an exploration of where we sense God's Spirit to be leading us. ## VESTRY NOTES

The vestry met for its monthly meeting on June 15. After an opening prayer, and discussion of the Gospel reading for the coming Sunday, the minutes were accepted and treasurer's report for May was approved.

John Robbert, Senior Warden, reported on a recent meeting with PUMH, DNREC, Diocesan Trustees and ourselves. After an update on PUMH minor developments, a discussion ensued about allowing DNREC to pump dredged materials from the Assawoman Canal onto a portion of the Lighthipe property. The vestry gave tentative approval pending assurances that testing would confirm that the dredge fell within EPA guidelines. DNREC would reimburse St. Martha's in an amount at least equal to the present farm rental income.

John then suggested the formation of a group to be called "St. Martha's Ambassadors" to both reach out to recent visitors and those

within the parish who may be in times of grief or despair. He will follow up with an article.

Paul Ross, Junior Warden, reviewed a check list of recent building concerns and actions. He will seek to form a Buildings and Grounds Committee, one member who would be designated "Safety Committee Officer". He is also seeking a volunteer to video tape the church property, inside and out, as well as its contents.

There was ongoing discussion over the future role of Tom McCormick, once he is ordained vocational deacon later this year. It was stressed that the role primarily involves specific actions within Sunday services and assisting the parish to reach out to needs in our area, with special responsibility for the home repair team.

Jack Smith provided the Finance Committee with a potential discussion list of budget cuts. These were then brought to the vestry and adopted, totaling \$15,755. The Committee will be continuing to work at closing the gap between projected income and expenses.

The rector led a closing prayer at 8:55.

## **INQUIRERS and TRANSFERS and MEMBERSHIP**

How does one become a member of St. Martha's Church?

This is a commonly asked question. Options are:

1. Request a transfer from the congregation where you are presently a member. Lynne Watson can request these from Episcopal Churches or you may contact the church on your own.
2. Be presented to the Bishop upon his visitation on September 20 for confirmation, or for Reception if previously with the Roman Catholic Church. Speak to the rector about your desire or questions.
3. Write out your full name, place and date of birth, and place and date of baptism and give this to the rector or parish secretary for entry into the parish register.

Slips will be available in the narthex for individuals to indicate their interest in becoming members of St. Martha's. Booklets about the Episcopal Church are also available for reading. Whether one decides to follow through and become a member will be seen as an individual decision. The books are being made available to assist each on their spiritual journey. Conversations with the rector are also invited.

The Outreach Committee met on June 9<sup>th</sup> with the following present: Dottie Seyfried, Pauline Wise, Jere Wise, Dennis Rhodes, Mary Lou Dogoloff, Mary Thormeyer, Ted Radcliffe, George Watson, Bill Wickham, Carl Mantegna, and Joyce Wickham. Chairperson Ted opened with prayer.

The committee enjoyed cake (baked by Mary Lou), ice cream, and coffee as we said good-bye to Dottie Seyfried who, with Ed, will soon be moving to Lewes. We are grateful to Dottie for her years of service to the Outreach

Committee, and wish the Seyfrieds well in their new home. We are expecting that they will be frequent visitors to St. Martha's after they're settled. They will be missed.

Dottie reported that almost all of the 100 bags of the Bishop's Blend coffee has been sold. Each bag of this delicious free-trade coffee nets Episcopal Relief & Development 15%. Thanks to all who purchased the coffee.

Thanks also to the congregation for its generosity in supporting donations for the "water fund" for the USO at Dover Air Force Base. We were able to send the USO a check for \$238.00, with which they'll purchase bottled water for the workers and families served at the mortuary service at the base. They are most appreciative and we plan to restart this campaign again in July.

We're happy to say we have had 28 applications to Camp Arrowhead from local children and their parents outside of the St. Martha's community. St. Martha's and the diocese split the cost of each scholarship to this camp in Rehoboth. It is another example of outreach to the community beyond ourselves, and is most appreciated by the children and their families who might not otherwise be able to afford a camping experience.

George Watson shared the sad news that the Sussex County Aids program is closing its doors on June 30<sup>th</sup>. This group helped patients and their loved ones struggling with Aids. We will follow up in future newsletters with information on any plans in the area to help this population.

International Students' picnics hosted at St. Martha's took place on June 23<sup>rd</sup> and another one scheduled for August 18<sup>th</sup>. Food sign-ups and suggestions are available on the bulletin board outside the kitchen.

Discussion continued regarding the following:

- expanding the Food For Thought program in local schools. We hope to have the co-founder of this program, Linda Maxwell, Ted and Lois Radcliffe's daughter, speak about this program at church in July.
- discussion of possible nominations to fill Dottie's place on the Outreach Committee, with a decision to be made in September.
- Bill Wickham shared his contact with the woman who directs a local effort to raise money for a "Playgrounds in Palestine" non-profit. The committee will further investigate this organization and discuss it in September.
- Bill also shared information about a national organization called Angel Food Ministries. Locally the group works through The River Church Wesleyan Methodist and distributes a full week's supply of groceries to those paying a minimum of \$30 each. The organization encourages payment above the \$30 amount, if possible, and the extra amount goes to subsidize those who can't afford the whole \$30 minimum. Food is distributed weekly at the Indian River High School with the help of volunteers. Call The River Church Wesleyan if you would like more information about this program.

Outreach adjourned, with prayer, for the summer. The next meeting will be September 8<sup>th</sup> at 1PM.
